### **Purpose**

Explore different ideas for taking action, including through existing Trócaire programmes.

Taking action is a key part of global citizenship education (GCE). It is important that we not only engage our head and our heart with global justice issues through the activities included on the Tree of Justice, but that we also look for ways to roll up our sleeves and use our hands to take action and make a difference.

# **Different Ways to Take Action Awareness Raising**

The most important first step is to raise awareness of the global justice issue you are focusing on. There are many different ways to do this:

- Create posters to hang around your school
- Create a noticeboard or display in a specific location in your school
- Create a website or use social media
- Set up a photo exhibition in your school
- Make a short documentary on your chosen global justice issue (See The Right Focus)
- Make a game for younger students to play (See Game Changers)

## Campaigning

Campaigns are a great way to bring about change at different levels, building on awareness raising. There are many different campaigning tools to consider:

- Online petitions
- Speak to people in power (local councillors, TDs, MPs, MEPs), either in person or perhaps
- Hold a meeting in your school with local community leaders or politicians
- Join with others working on the same issues (See the Irish Schools Sustainability Network)
- Get your community involved
- Volunteer with an organisation working on global justice issues

# **Game Changers**

Game Changers is a programme and competition for young people who are interested in investigating and exploring issues of global justice, and are committed to taking action to raise awareness of these issues with others. Using games-based learning (GBL) and game design, young people choose an issue of global justice related to the SDGs and create a game that raises awareness of their chosen issue through the game play.

## **The Right Focus**

The Right Focus is Trócaire's new documentary film-making programme, exploring global justice issues through the lens of short documentary films. It is aimed at young people in post-primary schools and youth groups throughout Ireland who have a passion for global justice, are interested in documentary film-making and want to make a difference.

Documentary film-making is one of the most powerful ways to raise awareness and communicate with a wide audience on global justice issues, to bring these injustices front and centre in people's minds and hopefully inspire them to take action and make a difference. All you need is a passion for a global justice issue, a smartphone and the techniques you will gain through the programme.
