Purpose

To support students to understand the origins and importance of human rights, a key aspect of global justice.



Materials

- Worksheet 1: Teacher Bingo Sheet
- Worksheet 2: Bingo Cards
- Worksheet 3: Human Rights Cards
- Global Goals Photo Pack
- Exploring Justice video

Activity 1: Human Rights Bingo Step 1

Split the students into pairs. Worksheet 2: Bingo Cards includes ten different bingo cards. Give each pair one bingo card. Using Worksheet 1: Teacher Bingo Sheet and a random number generator read the description of each right as its number is chosen. The students must identify which right is being described and mark it off their bingo card (if applicable). Keep going until someone shouts bingo because all of the rights on their sheet have been read out.

Optional Step 2

Go to the following link for the Story of Human

Rights video. This video is from the USA and brings viewers on a journey through the history of human rights.



Activity 2: Human Rights and the Sustainable Development Goals

Step 1

Begin by showing the introduction to the SDGs from The World's Largest Lesson, located here.



Step 2

Split the class up into groups of three or four. Give each group a copy of Worksheet 3: Human Rights Cards. Work through the following questions, which will encourage a deeper analysis of the rights. After each question, ask some students for feedback and to justify their choices.

- Which of the rights do you find most important as a teenager?
- Which of the rights seem more important to people over fifty?

- Which rights seem more important to women?
- Which rights seem more important to children under five years old?
- Which rights seem more important to people living in poverty?
- Where in Ireland can you see examples of rights being ignored?
- Where in the world do you see rights being ignored?

Explain to the students that while the rights are universal, which means applicable to every human being on the planet, some become more important at different stages of our lives.







































These rights are adapted from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights from the United Nations. Ask the students if they can think of any other documents or sources where human rights have been identified or listed. Refer to the Story of Human Rights video.

Step 3

Give each group a copy of the Trócaire Global Goals Photo Pack from the trunk of the Tree of Justice. Ask them to link each human right with one or more of the SDGs, using Worksheet 3: Human Right Cards and the Global Goals Photo Pack. Encourage the students to use the SDG

targets on the front, and the photo on the back to help them identify links.

Optional steps depending on group:

Option 1

Using Trócaire's SDG wheel, ask the students to shout out a right that is linked to the SDG chosen on each spin by the wheel.



Option 2

Each young person gets a rights card and must choose which SDG to link it to, giving an explanation as to why they think it links.

Activity 3

Watch the Exploring Justice video, then ask the students to identify what rights are being denied in each of the three countries featured. Collate any suggestions from the students on the board under the following headings.
