LENT 2023: FAMILY LENTEN RESOURCE



INFORMATION FOR LEADERS, PARENTS OR TEACHERS

This resource is recommended for use in the following ways:

- In a family Mass setting
- In a children's liturgy group in parishes
- At home around the kitchen table
- In a catholic primary school, during religious education time with your class

This Lent Trócaire is highlighting the impact of conflict, drought and climate change on families in Somalia. This is a difficult topic and some of the information may not be suitable to share with younger children. Emphasis should be placed on the positive impact that our actions can have and how by working together we can create a fairer world.

Activities

There are four activities in this resource. Activity one is a printable calendar that has suggestions for each day of Lent. Parishes are invited to print copies and distribute them on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday. The ideas are suitable for all age groups.

Activities two, three and four can be used on any Sunday during the lenten season. The activities are related to this year's lenten family, marking fifty years of Trócaire and designing your own Trócaire hox.

Global Issues

Resources, like this one, that focus on global issues can resonate with individuals through their lived experience. We advise that you read through this resource in full and modify anything that you feel may impact an individual or a group you work with. Be particularly aware of families in your parish from Somalia and other countries on the Horn of Africa, where drought and unbearable hunger are affecting much of the population.

ACTIVITY TWO: NASTEHA AND HER FAMILY

Nasteha is eight years old and is from a country called Somalia. She lives with her mum Ambiyo, her dad Mahat and her seven siblings.

It has not rained in Somalia for three years. Without rain, plants and crops cannot grow and animals cannot find enough grass to eat.

Nasteha's family are farmers and used to have two hundred goats. All of the goats died. The family was very sad. Nasteha's parents made the decision to leave their home and move closer to a town to get help. They all walked for three days to get to a town called Luuq.

Nasteha lives in a hut with her family. The hut is in a camp where people go when they have to leave their homes. Their hut is very simple but it gives the family protection from the sun and the wind.

ACTIVITY THREE: HAPPY 50TH BIRTHDAY TRÓCAIRE

Trócaire is the Irish word for compassion. This means showing love and kindness to others.

Trócaire turns the compassion of the Irish people into life-changing support for people around the world who need it.

We are an Irish organisation that was set up by the Irish Catholic Church in 1973.

At that time, there were some difficult events happening around the world, including some bad flooding in a country called Bangladesh. Letters were read out in churches all over the island of Ireland one Sunday, asking people to show kindness and compassion and to donate money to help people struggling in Bangladesh.


For the last fifty years, the very generous people of Ireland have continued to donate money to Trócaire. We use this money to help people to live healthier, happier and safer lives all around the world.

We work closely with local organisations within the countries where we work.



We share ideas, skills and the money that has been donated so that local people can help themselves and their communities.

We work in over twenty countries in Africa, Asia, the Middle East and Central America. Trócaire tries to make sure that the world is a fair and just place. We want to make sure that everyone has access to food and water.

Did you know that there is enough food for everyone in the world, but that it is not shared equally? So many people around the world are hungry.

We try to make sure that people have lands to grow crops that they can eat and also sell to make money. We also work with communities to make sure that they have safe and clean water to drink and to use for washing and to water their crops.

We help people after a humanitarian crisis. This is when a group of people are affected by a war or a natural disaster, such as a flood, an earthquake or a hurricane.

We provide food, medicine and shelter straight after the disaster. We also help communities to be better prepared for future disasters.

Chat Together

- 1) Read the story of Trócaire on page 8 together.
- 2) Have you shared kindness with other people? What was that like?
- 3) What ideas do you have to build a fairer world?
- 4) Ask an older adult you know about their memories of the Trócaire box.

Work Together

- 1) On a globe or a world map find three of the countries where Trócaire works.
- 2) Look up five facts about a country where Trócaire works. (For example, what animals live there? What's the weather like?) Do you think life is very different there than in Ireland?



ACTIVITY FOUR: GREATE YOUR OWN TRÓCAIRE BOX

This is a Trócaire box. It is one of the ways we collect money during Lent each year.

People put a Trócaire box in their home and put a little bit of money in each day or week. At the end of Lent, they bring it to their local church.

Last year the very generous people from the island of Ireland donated €8 million. During Lent, churches, schools and young people play a huge part in this and they're always very generous. We want to thank you very much for your support each year.

Many amazing people have appeared on the Trócaire box. They have shared their stories with us. The money you give does not go to these

people alone; it helps many, many people all around the world.

This Lent we're asking the children of Ireland to create and build their very own Trócaire box with our My Trócaire Box activity. This project has been available in many primary schools and is now open to young people through their parish. If you are interested, you can download the My Trócaire Box template here.

Getting designing and colouring – and enjoy!


